

wenty-five years ago, when Carl was about eighteen years old, he asked me how he would know when he had truly fallen in love. How would he know that it wasn't simply infatuation or passion and that she was the right person? Today, Carl tells me that I said something to him about recognizing that if you have to ask the question, it probably isn't love; it is probably the woman who best captures the most attractive aspects of all the women he has ever dated, liked, or loved.

For the next twenty years or so, Carl never seemed to find that love he was seeking—until one day, it happened. He fell in love and got married. Five years later, I asked Carl if it was indeed love. He said he believed it was, even though during those years of empty seeking, he thought true love would never come to him. He also said he's convinced that it was the hand of God that brought them together. Of that, he has no doubts.

In its own way, Carl's story is really the story of Peter and his friends going fishing and finding nothing all night long. Then, at dawn, a voice from the shore suggests that they try the other side of the boat. Lo and behold, an abundance appears where there had been only emptiness. That's when Peter and his friends realize, "It is the Lord!" For us, too, we have those moments when we recognize God's hand in our lives. •

#### Finding Spiritual Clarity

In his book, <u>Riding the Dragon</u>, author Robert J. Wicks relates the following story:

My mother asked me to prepare her two front barrels for summer plants. I knew this meant weeding out the old dry spring plants and adding new fertilizer to the soil. I did what I thought was a good job, and proudly announced in a loud voice, "I'm finished."

She came up beside me and poked her garden stick into the barrels. She smiled, nudged me, and in a lilting voice teased, "Well, my heavens, you're like a hen; you've only just scratched around on the surface."

When I looked at her with a question on my face, she put her arm around me, pointed to the soil, and advised, "Dig down deep and shake up the soil. In this way, you will allow the air through and you will be getting the fertilizer to mix down deep in the soil where it's needed."


Our Lenten practices of prayer, fasting and alms-giving are intended to accomplish in our spiritual lives what deep digging and 'shaking up' the soil was intended to do in the above story. But what we generally do, in a quite human fashion, is superficially stir things up, moving them around and then declaring that we have been transformed. We think we are finished with regard to awakening our spiritual life. But what happens? We find soon enough that we have not gone far enough to really matter; we find ourselves slipping back into old habits.

Lent is past and we are gliding through the blissful days of Easter joy; but it is still time for digging deeply and shaking things up in our soul. The spiritual transformations undertaken, and even accomplished during Lent, are intended as a trial run for life itself, for all of life, for all of our days.

Discipleship is not some trick of the imagination nor a one-time-does-it-all task. Rather it is a life-time commitment to recognize God present in our lives through the action of the Holy Spirit and a firm intention to maintain a rigorous discipline of spiritual endeavor.

Don't give up yet – keep digging deeply and stirring up that spiritual soil! There is new growth to come if we prepare for it!

## My Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Entering the third week of Easter and the first full week of May, I was challenged to *value time* and contemplate how quickly time seems to go by the older we get. I am sure many of you have thought about this as you have gotten older and have observed how time seems to be a blur. The secret is to value each moment we are given and share the time we are given with others.

> Today will never come again. Be a blessing. Be a friend. **Encourage someone. Take** time to care. Let your words heal, and not wound.

Recently I read a book by Monsignor Charles Pope. The book is titled: The Hell There Is. In it Msgr. Pope states that many Catholics underestimate the power of Hell and the possibility that we may end up there. He notes that 21 of the 38 parables in the Gospel are about Hell (often spoken of as Gehenna). Nobody loves you more than Jesus, yet no one spoke of Hell more than Jesus. Further in his book, Msgr. maintains that it is possible for people to go to Hell because people are free to choose God or to reject God. All of us are distracted by minor worldly things and souls are being lost as a result. What is at stake is the spiritual battle for Heaven, and against Hell.

A better use of your time and energy would be to discover a way to remind yourself, not of guilt or imperfection, but of the love God has for you. It is indeed awesome and amazing, as the song so accurately celebrates: "Amazing grace, how sweet the sound, that saved a wretch like me."
