REFLECTIONS

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

The fundamental dogma on which everything in Christianity is based is that of the Blessed Trinity in whose name all Christians are baptized. The celebration, then, is to be understood and celebrated as a focus on the mysteries of Christ and as the solemn expression of our faith in our triune God through whom we have access through Baptism to the redemption won for us by Christ.

The feast associated with the Blessed Trinity has its origins in the 9th century, but it was only in the 14th century that it was included in the general calendar of the Church by Pope John XXII. However, the cult of the Holy Trinity is to be found throughout liturgy and history. Christians have always had cause to praise and adore our God who has shown his mercy towards us, giving us a share in the divine life.

In its essence the dogma of the Holy Trinity is simple. There is one God and in this one God there are three divine Persons: the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God. There are not three God, but one, eternal, incomprehensible God! The Father is the first divine Person; the Son is the second divine Person, begotten from the nature of the Father from eternity; the Holy Spirit is the third divine Person, proceeding from the Father and the Son. Admittedly, no human mind can grasp this mystery, but we believe and live the reality in faith since it is revealed by scripture.

The celebration of the Holy Trinity is often said to be a celebration of thanksgiving representing a synthesis of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, Ascension and Pentecost. Indeed, every Sunday is a constant reminder of the work of the Trinity: the Father creates us; the Son redeems us; the Spirit sanctifies us for discipleship. We are baptized in the Trinitarian formula, we sign ourselves in that same reality when we enter the Church and begin and end Mass with that formula. The Holy Trinity is our origin; the Holy Trinity is our daily discipleship; the Holy Trinity is our destination when we are merged with the divine at the end of our lives.


