REFLECTIONS

A nurse working on a pediatric ward in a large urban hospital, before listening to the little ones' chests, would always prepare them for this, perhaps to them, alarming procedure. She would plug the ear pieces of the stethoscope into their ears and allow them to listen to their own heart beat. This technique in general allowed the children to get over any fright at this simple, but important medical procedure. She noted that the children's eyes would always light up with a sense of awe the first time they heard their own heart beat.

Her experience with four-year-old David was even more intriguing, an experience she would never forget.

Gently she tucked the stethoscope ear pieces into David's ears, and then placed the metal disc over his heart.

"Listen," she told him. "Do you hear anything special?" "What do you hear? And what do you suppose that sound might be?"

David listened for a few moments, obviously in awe but also with something of a puzzled look on his face. The nurse could see him gently nodding his head to the rhythmic sound deep in his chest.

Finally his face broke out in a wondrous grin. He smiled at the nurse, announcing, "I know what it is . . . it's Jesus knocking!"



The story has its obvious interpretation with regard to the physical, but highlights as well a spiritual reality. The beat of our hearts is not something we listen to, or even pay much attention to on a regular basis, but it does remind us of the intricate working of our bodies, just part of God's greatest creation, humanity. And who knows, perhaps it is also 'Jesus knocking."


Recently I came across reflections from Sister Theresita with the Holy Family of Nazareth that I thought to share with you:
